May President's Letter



Greetings MOS Friends,

Happy May. Here we are already 5 months into the year. Summer is just around the corner with Memorial Day, the unofficial start of summer, even closer. The weather is quickly warming; I'm able to take Kitsu for her morning walk without a jacket. Plus, lizards and squirrels abound making those walks sometimes a bit frantic when one jumps out in front of her. Kitsu has figured out that one of the houses behind me has a feeder so the squirrels congregate there making for good hunting. I don't know what she would do if she ever actually caught one but I do my best to not

let that happen.

I'm in SoCal for Levi's 7th birthday on the 6th. It is true that one never forgets the days their children are born but it's also true that one never forgets the days that the grandchildren were born. That day was a bunch of us sitting in a waiting room for word that the baby had been born. We did not know that during that time the kid was stuck and it took several doctors to dislodge him - and, that kid is still stubborn. As I'm writing this well before the 6th, I'll tell you in the next letter what actually happened

The various building projects are finally in motion. My patio is just a few stones and some bender boards from being completed. What was about a 150

Unfortunately, paint just does not stand up to 30 years of weather without maintenance. About 15 years before I bought this place, the previous owner had begun a program of deferred maintenance meaning that really nothing was done. It's finally getting fixed.

Next will come finishing the painting inside and some revamping in the kitchen. There's a lot of work to be accomplished before the end of the year. Ya gotta have goals or nothing is accomplished.

I hope you were able to make it out to Mary's sale at California Orchids. I went there really not expecting to purchase much. I should really know better. A couple of small plants here, a Cattleya on a log there, and another variety of Rhipsalis in between and I ended up with 8 plants. Mary really does have great plants but I need to learn to live within a plant budget. Well, either that, or I need to purchase only outdoor plants, because I have room there.

Our April Marin Orchid Society meeting was quite successful. Our speaker, Bob Hamilton, was terrific, really capturing the audience. And, as this was our first in-person meeting in some time, we had a great turnout. We had 28 people in attendance, most of them in the room. Our speaker brought a great opportunity table which spurred record-breaking raffle ticket sales. We also had a great display of plants in both our actual and virtual show and tell tables. Thank you to Kol Shofar for hosting our meeting and to Kurt who set up all the AV equipment.

Our next three meetings will be virtual meetings, on Zoom only. These meetings are hosted by Mount Baker Orchid Society. You'll see connection details in the upcoming Back Bulbs. We will likely continue our partnership with Mount Baker as that has proved valuable in opening up our speaker pool. The virtual meeting format allows us to obtain speakers from much farther away. Right now, MBOS and MOS equally share the meeting load. For those meetings where we are the host, we will have in-person meetings. Our usual meeting place at BioMarin has not yet reopened. However, it appears that Kol Shofar will be available for our meetings. Plus, they have an awesome AV setup.

May Speaker - Brandon Tam Topic: Huntington Orchid Collection



Brandon Tam oversees one of the largest orchid collections in the United States and one of the most diverse species collections in the world, which has grown from 2,000 to over 10,000 plants in the past decade. He manages over 3,600 unique varieties, representing 280 genera, 2,200 hybrids, and 1,500 species, including, but not limited to, *Paphiopedilum, Phragmipedium, Cymbidium, Cattleya*, and *Stanhopea*. Brandon is responsible for the day-to-day horticultural operations, including acquisitions, propagation, conservation, and supervision of over 40 orchid volunteers. He is also tasked with coordinating numerous public and education events, such as orchid shows, judgings, and conferences. Brandon began managing the collection when he was 16 and has been with The Huntington for over 13 years as the Orchid Collection Specialist.

The Huntington Collection:

"With over 10,000 orchid plants, The Huntington has one of the largest orchid collections in the United States and one of the five most diverse collections in the world, with over 3,600 unique varieties, representing 280 genera. The collection has grown significantly through donations, acquisitions, and propagations in the last decade. These orchids and other tropical plants are maintained in three off-view greenhouses and one public conservatory, totaling over 26,000 square feet in space. The extensive diversity of orchids within the collections enables staff to display blooming orchids year-round in the Rose Hills Foundation Conservatory for Botanical Science, where examples of rare plants are rotated on a weekly basis for the public to view, and appreciate. The Huntington also focuses on other important orchid aspects such as art, rare book, and archival collecting because it plays a large role in the history of this magnificent plant family.

Join us on a virtual tour of the collection as we discover the importance of this collection and the role it plays in the botanical world."

April Speaker Review Orchid Craze: History of the Rise and Fall of Orchid Raising & Odontoglossum and Pleurothallids with Robert Hamilton

Robert Hamilton and his partner, John Leathers, grow and hybridize cool growing Andean orchids. Robert focused on the exploration and discovery of orchids in South America, particularly in the Andes regions around the equator in Bolivia, Ecuador and Peru. Throughout this region, there are lots of valleys and 'pockets' in the Andes that favor speciation.

A number of factors contributed to the 19th century orchid craze. In the early 19th century, the explorer-scientist Alexander von Humboldt developed the concept of isotherms, the idea that specific elevations resulted in habitants for specific plants. The American public was introduced to the beauty of the Andes in the mid 19th century through stunning landscape paintings by artists such as Frederick E. Church. The 19th century was a fertile time for invention: the first vaccine, Mendel's law of inheritance, the laying of the first transatlantic cable.

An important invention for orchid culture in England, where they could not grow unprotected, was a process for making sheet glass for use in windows. This invention ushered in the modern greenhouse, the architecture of which was spearheaded by Joseph Paxton. Paxton is most famous for his design of the Crystal Palace for the Great Exhibition of 1851 (essentially one of the first World's Fairs). His design was the culmination of experiments in greenhouse design based on the architecture of the huge leaves of the Victoria regia lily. Greenhouses were only one contributor to the orchid craze during the Victorian era when wealthy collectors indulged their passion for orchids by funding expeditions to collect plants (without care to habitat destruction) and held exhibitions where they could show off their collections. Sir George Holford had a huge exhibit at the Temple Orchid show of 1904, made possible by cutting flower spikes off before they bloomed for 3 years prior to the show.

Sir George Holford also bred orchids, including the hybrid *Cymbidium Alexanderi* (registered in 1911). The cultivar 'Westonbrit' is famous, and is in the lineage of many of today's hybrids. The first *Ondontoglossum* hybrid was *Oda. Vuylstekeae*, registered in 1904. During the late 1800s, early 1900s, advances were made that enabled orchids seed germination. Noel Bernard, a French botanist, based on observation of an orchid growing under decaying wood in Fontainebleau forest, postulated that orchid seeds required

symbiotic fungus for germination. In 1922, Lewis Knudsen introduced asymbiotic culture, essentially growing seeds in a flask on nutrient rich medium. This allowed orchid breeding to be much more accessible. Now, in Taiwan, orchid farming is subsided by the government. Orchids have gone from the conservatory, in Victorian times, to Costco.

Robert and John Leathers, share a 375 square-foot greenhouse in Berkeley and another (3250 square feet) in Pacifica (Hawk Hill Nursery). John grows and hybridizes predominantly masdevallias. Recent masdevallia hybrids he has made and registered include Robert Hamilton (2020), Devil's Heart, Royal Flush and Mayan Princess, the latter all of which were registered in 2022. He also grows Draculas including the species Drac. vampira and Drac. gorgona. Draculas are hard to grow, but John has made some crosses including Dracula Raven, registered in 2005 and Dracula Maltese Falcon (registered in 2012). John observed with his Drac. Raven seedlings, that those seedlings that grew on a rotten bench bloomed more quickly and with greater vigor than flask/pot grown seedlings, lending some credence to rumors that better plants come out of symbiotic culture.

Robert grows and hybridizes what were previously classified as *Odontoglossums. Odm. crispum* is one of the most important species in *Odontoglossum* hybridizing. Robert highlighted the following *Odm*. hybrids which are examples of the different patterns and colors in hybrid Odontoglossums. There is Odm. Anne Grippe 'Tiffany' and Odm. Jim Mintsiveris. The latter, registered in 1997 is one of the black and white Odontoglossums, so-called because of the white and very dark colors of the flowers. Robert noted that the dark portion of the flower grows at a different rate than the white, which is not an issue as long as the different color areas are broken up. Oda. Murray River 'Golden Fire' is an example of a cross between the (former) genera Odontoglossum and Cochlioda). Robert has made and registered several of these types of crosses including Oda. Florence Stirling and Oda. Picotee. Another cross of his is Miltonidium Nova. He buys flasks from the noted southern California Odontoglossum hybridizer, Robert Dugger. As he has a laboratory, Robert is able to do things like treat with an anti- mitotic to increase chromosome count from 2n to 4n. Initially he used colchicine, he now uses Oryzalin. He showed pictures of 2n and 4n examples of the species *Odm. hallii* and *Odm. veitchiana*. Increasing the ploidy tends to results in larger flowers with greater substance.

Robert talked some about the changes in taxonomy over the last several years, presumably due to DNA similarities, which has resulted in the former *Ondotoglossum* genera, among others, all being lumped together in the genera *Oncidium*. This has resulted in some mayhem in hybrid naming and genealogy. He does not support

this decision, and comments that by following this logic, humans and chimps should be in a single genera, given the genomic differences between the two are arguably comparable to those between *Odontoglossums* and *Oncidiums*.

Robert talked about *Odontoglossum* culture. *Odotoglossums* should be in the smallest pot possible. They don't like to be wet so water when on the dry side. He prefers to have the bulbs shrivel a bit rather than have the roots rot. For feeding, he recommends a balanced fertilizer such as 20-20-20. The trend now is to use a fertilizer lower in phosphorus based on the argument that anything you put in the plant that can't be used is a stress to the plant getting water. He feeds for two weeks then uses fresh water on the third week. He notes that *Odontoglossums* like a ten degree drop in temperature at night and are hardy down to 48 degrees.
