# March Speaker - Jean Allen-Ikeson Oncidium Fuscatum



Oncidium fuscatum was once known as Miltonia warscewiczii yet never quite fit that genus. It is one time that transfer to Oncidium due to DNA analysis was a win for everyone. Although it is a bit of an ugly duckling, it has proven to be an outstanding pedigree builder for the last 100 years through such hybrids as Irene, Wildcat and Catatante for adding red and a large lip to the progeny.

Jean Allen-Ikeson lives outside Dundas, Ontario at the western tip of Lake Ontario in Canada. She is an accredited AOS judge in the Toronto Judging Centre, Chair of the Editorial Board of the AOS and National Education Coordinator of the AOS. She was awarded the Silver Medal in 2021 and the President's Award in 2022 by the AOS. She enthusiastically grows a variety of Cattleyas, Oncidinae, Cymbidiums, Dendrobiums and Sarcochilus in her 1000 sq. ft. attached greenhouse.



# Graham Ramsey - February Speaker Review Repotting with New Zealand's Finest

Our February speaker was the orchid enthusiast, hybridizer and exhibitor Graham Ramsey who spoke to us about 'Repotting with New Zealand's Finest'. Gordon began his talk reminding us that all orchids need light, water, appropriate temperature, and air movement. Unique to orchids is that they require air movement around the roots. Providing water and air movement to the roots was the basis for Graham's talk on three different growing mediums. He discussed three mediums: sphagnum moss, tree fern and orchid bark, specifically those from New Zealand (NZ) which he argues have benefits over those from other sources.

There are two New Zealand companies that are sources for sphagnum moss, Sphagmoss and One Mile Moss. Both companies source the moss from moss bogs. Graham argues that there are several reasons why these mosses are preferable to those from other sources. First, the species of moss is Sphagnum cristatum which has superior water holding capacity. The NZ

mosses are sustainably harvested and are subject to exceptional quality control (QC). The moss is graded by length but is otherwise the same. To repot *Neofinetia*, long strand moss is preferable whereas it isn't necessary for repotting *Phalaenopsis*. Finally, the NZ government is supportive of the industry facilitating the availability and reliability of the supply.

Graham next spoke about NZ tree fern which he thinks is such an exciting product that he has done a complete program just on it. Tree fern comes from a fern (sp. Dicksonia) that grows quite large and looks like a tree. The 'trunk' is comprised of fibrous intertwined rhizomes.

All NZ tree fern logs are harvested on private land. Harvesting is tightly regulated to ensure continuous and ample supply. The logs are taken to a sawmill where they are cut into boards and then sterilized by kiln drying. These boards cut into slabs are used for mounting orchids. The NZ tree fern boards are denser, retain water better and don't dry out as quickly as the less dense tree fern boards from central America. The NZ tree fern boards stay damp for 2-3 days depending on the growing environment and rewet easily. Graham recommends sticking with central American tree fern boards for mounting *cattleyas* and *phalaenopsis* which like to dry out quickly but for other epiphytes, he suggests using the NZ tree fern boards.

Another tree fern product Graham is really excited about is tree fern fiber. This product has the same source as the boards but is made by putting the logs through a grinder to get fiber and fines. Osmunda is the South American chopped up tree fern product and is much coarser than that from NZ. The NZ product is very absorbent. Graham has written several articles on NZ tree fern products - see AOS Orchids vol 87 #8, July 2018 and AOS Orchids vol 89 #10 Oct 2020 - links below. A benefit of the NZ tree fern product is that the Dicksonia species is a fibrous orchid friendly medium that holds more moisture and nutrients but decomposes very slowly. He has been using NZ tree fern for over 5 years and has seen no evidence of decomposition. NZ tree fern is sustainably harvested and is also the beneficiary of the NZ government being friendly to the industry.

Finally, Graham spoke about bark, specifically Orchiata. Orchiata is derived from pine radiata bark that is from Monterey pine which is widespread in California. Back in the mid-1800s, Monterey pine was discovered to grow like a weed in NZ. Now, it is a stable timber crop there, as it is 20 years from seedling to harvest. Furthermore, the bark was found to be a great orchid substrate. Now the tree wood is harvested for timber and the bark for orchid medium. Orchiata bark is processed by aging in wind rows under closely regulated heat so there is composting only at the outer surface. This results in a bark chip with a water absorbent outer surface but a water resistant inner surface. The bark chips are graded for size and tested for the presence of invertebrates. Dolomite is added to raise the pH to 6.5 before bagging and shipping to Arcadian Supply in Savannah, Georgia (US distributor).

Orchiata comes in 5 different sizes. The smallest is Precision which Graham finds useful for deflasked orchids and for growing small or delicate miniature orchids. He finds Classic useful for seedlings and for plants that he wants to keep damp. For example, he uses Classic for *Phragmipediums*. He repots *Phrags* every year; sometimes he waters them everyday when hot. For any of these, he recommends mixing in sponge rock, perlite and/or charcoal to help

maintain ventilation, particularly with the small bark sizes. Power is the middle of road bark, it can grow anything. Power Plus is useful for growing *Cattleyas* and *Phalaenopsis*. He uses the Super bark size instead of peanuts in the bottom of pots. When repotting, he takes the roots with the Super 'peanuts' and moves in the next pot, minimizing root disruption.

Graham addressed why Orchiata bark is better. It has a very hard physical structure. This is true for both Orchiata and Kiwi bark but whereas both have the same starting material, he is unaware whether the latter has been treated like Orchiata. Orchiata comes in five different sizes, and although it should be wetted before use, it is otherwise ready to go. Orchiata bark has been endorsed by the AOS as well.

Graham provided a few hints on use of these products. He never repots with dry sphagnum moss but soaks it in warm water for an hour or two, then drains it and squeezes out any excess water. For tree fern slabs, he completely submerges them for a few hours to fully hydrate before mounting plants. With shredded tree fern, he rinses out the fines. He typically doesn't add other media components to tree fern fiber or to sphagnum moss.

As noted above, Arcadian Supply (<u>arcadiansupply.com</u>) is the US distributor for these New Zealand orchid products. They do have an orchid society pallet program where societies can buy a pallet of materials at reduced cost.

We thank Gordon for an interesting and informative program.


