# November President's Letter



## Happy New Year, MOS Friends,

Best wishes for a great New Year.

Well, we are off into a new year. I hope your start was better than mine.

I had a great Christmas with the kids. Kids were excited to open so many gifts. I gave Evelyn Disney Princess books. Levi's big gift was a massive Lego builder set from which we helped him build a roller coaster. We also had great dinners: the traditional Chinese feast for the 24<sup>th</sup> and Lobster Mac 'n

Cheese on Christmas Day.

But the day after I returned home, I came down with a terrible cold, and tested positive for COVID. A course of antivirals put me right in a couple of days. Turns out that 4 of us all became ill the same day. As a result, I was self-isolated on the 31<sup>st</sup> so, great birthday and end of 2023. Good part, I did get to watch a significant portion of the Twilight Zone marathon on Syfy. There was one episode that I do not recall having seen before - incredible considering how long I've been watching that program.

Now that my greenhouse has been up for a while, some challenges. First, it is

a plastic tent over a frame; rainwater and leaves accumulate between the roof supports and bulge the roof down. I've put in a couple of large pool noodles that arch from the edge to the peak to give more support to the canopy and relieves rainwater pooling. Still needs more reinforcement.

A second issue is temperature. Perhaps a colder winter this year than last, greenhouse temperature is remaining closer to outdoor ambient where the smaller greenhouse consistently stayed about 10F higher. The drop may be because I now have a larger fan to circulate the air or that the longer sides do not seal as well with the ground. So, maybe a heater will be necessary.

But mitigating those issues will need to wait. I have a few things to accomplish before the end of February when I have company staying for about 6 weeks.

I want to thank everyone who attended the Holiday Luncheon in December. I think everyone had a good time and the venue was certainly nice as was the food. The gift exchange was also quite lively.

POE is coming in mid-February. Now is the time to start dressing up your marvelous plants to make them ready for showing at our exhibit. The theme this year is Timeless Orchids. Naoko is making a design for the exhibit. The rough cut so far looks really good. We are looking for a couple of volunteers to help with the set-up and tear-down of the exhibit. The call for volunteers is elsewhere in the Back Bulb.

A reminder that the Santa Barbara orchid show is coming in March. If you have not attended this show, it is well worth the trip. The displays are large and complex and filled with marvelous plants. Plus, there are a number of nurseries in the area that also have sales.


Our January meeting will be at Kol Shofar. The venue for our subsequent meetings is still unknown, although we're still looking.

January 23 Speaker: Bob Marshall - LED Lights for Successful Indoor Orchid Growing



Bob Marshall is a professor emeritus at Western Washington University in Bellingham, WA. He and his wife have grown orchids exclusively in their home on windowsills and under lights for about 20 years. At present they have about 60 orchids, especially small fragrant *Cattleya* hybrids, *Cirrhopetalum* group, *Bulbophyllums*, and a variety of other genera. Their target is floral beauty, and to have five to ten plants in bloom all through the year. They began with natural light alone but soon supplemented with incandescent and fluorescent bulbs. About ten years ago they discovered LED grow and decorative lights. Since reading Kelly McCracken's Orchids Magazine articles on the newest LED lights and the difference between plants' and humans' needs for and uses of light, they have switched to Barrina LED lights throughout. Now they grow under lights at the windowsill. Growth, blooming and disease resistance have all improved significantly under this lighting.

#### Program

Humans and plants use light for different purposes. Understanding these differences is important when growing plants in artificial light. Recently, evolving LED technology has transformed growing under artificial light, separating especially heat and light as they are naturally bound in the sun's radiation. LED lights transform almost all the energy they receive into light useful for plants. Advances in LED technology now make it possible for home hobbyists to grow orchids indoors with abundant light at extremely low cost. The program will also show the Barrina brand light and how light useful to plants rather than to human vision can be measured and adapted to grow orchids at home.

#### Congratulations to Paul and Phyllis Chim!

Each year all of the AOS Judges nationwide vote on the best Orchid which has been awarded during the prior year, in each of about 20 categories. The 2022 awards were recently announced, and the winner of the prestigious Ernest Hetherington Award for the Best *Cymbidium* was awarded to Paul and Phyllis Chim for their *Cymbidium* Cranberry Velvet 'Mahalo Steve Williams' which had received the highest cultural award, a CCE/AOS. When it was entered for judging in April 2022 at CSNJC, it had 918 flowers and 76 buds on 46 inflorescences, cascading all the way around the plant. SPECTACULAR!!

# Preparing your Orchids for POE

Think of it as getting ready to go out on a special date...you want to look your best, right? So do your Orchids that are going to POE for the MOS display.

#### First the grooming:

a) Remove all spent bloom spikes and dead/yellow leaves, using a sterile cutting tool..

b) If the pseudobulbs or canes have dried brown sheaths, remove them by gently peeling them down (it is easiest to do this after watering, when they are damp). It is good to routinely remove these, because they provide hiding spots for insects like scale and mealybugs.

c) Do the leaves have white calcium deposits? These can be removed by wiping them with Neem oil diluted on a damp paper towel, or you can wipe the leaves with lemon juice or milk to break up the deposits.

#### Now it's time to get dressed:

a) Carefully stake-up each flower spike, so the flowers are shown to their best advantage. Use small clips or ties, which will not distract the viewer's eye from the flowers.

b) Place the plant in a black or other neutral color pot (nothing too showy, per our display captains), to be placed on the MOS display.

c) A LITTLE Spanish moss around the base of the plant in the pot, provides a nice finishing touch.

**Bring your ID**: Please be sure your name is on the bottom of each plant and the bottom of each display pot (printed address labels work well), so they easily find their way back home at the close of the show.


